Branching Out

From the Director's Desk

I am very excited to serve as Acorn Public Library District's new Library Director, and I want to use this opportunity to share with you a little bit about my background and philosophy of libraries. Public library management and administration has long been a passion of mine, so much so that it was one of my primary focus areas while I was earning my Master of Library and Information Studies degree from Dominican University. I envision libraries as being third places for their communities: hubs dedicated to meeting their patrons' diverse educational, recreational, cultural, informational, and technological needs and interests. Since communities' demands and wants are ever changing, libraries must resist complacency and consciously place themselves in a position to ask, "What more can we do for our patrons?" In this way, there are limitless possibilities for libraries to grow, expand, and serve as a third place. This patron-oriented, community-centered approach to librarianship is something that I carry with me as a guide for leading Acorn Public Library District into the future.

I also want to use this opportunity to highlight several changes to Acorn Library that have happened over the last several months. The first—and perhaps the most noticeable—change is that we replaced our old exterior sign in August. The new sign is perpendicular with Central Avenue to increase visibility for those traveling down the street and includes an LED electronic message, which means we are no longer restricted to just five rows of announcements.

The second change I want to mention is that we recently painted some of the walls and soffits in the Library's lower level, which not only adds color to the Youth Services Department but also helps to define spaces for young adults and children. We also added shelving that extends the entire length of the east wall in the children's section and freed up space that will soon become a small play area for young children.

Last, but not least, you may have noticed some new faces at Acorn. Please help me welcome them to Acorn!
