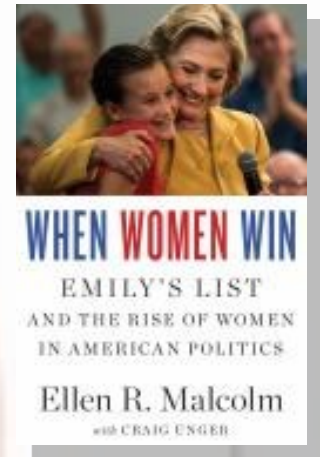
A Mind of Your Own by Kelly Brogan (CD 616.85 BRO)

Patients, overwhelmingly female, are looking for solutions, but according to Dr. Kelly Brogan, the help these women want can't be found at the pharmacy. She believes people need a new paradigm: The best way to heal the brain is to heal the body.

But What if We Are Wrong by Chuck Klosterman (CD 121 KLO)

Klosterman visualizes the contemporary world as it will appear to those who'll perceive it as the distant past. Kinetically slingshotting through a broad spectrum of objective and subjective problems, *But What if We Are Wrong?* is built on interviews with a variety of creative thinkers George Saunders, David Byrne, Jonathan Lethem, Kathryn Schulz, Neil deGrasse Tyson, Brian Greene, Junot Diaz, Amanda Petrusich, Ryan Adams, Nick Bostrom, Dan Carlin, and Richard Linklater, among others interwoven with the type of high-wire humor and nontraditional analysis only Klosterman would dare to attempt. It's a seemingly impossible achievement: a book about the things we cannot know, explained as if we did. It's about how we live now, once now has become then.
